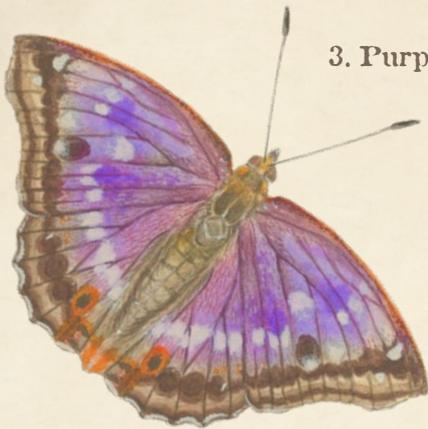

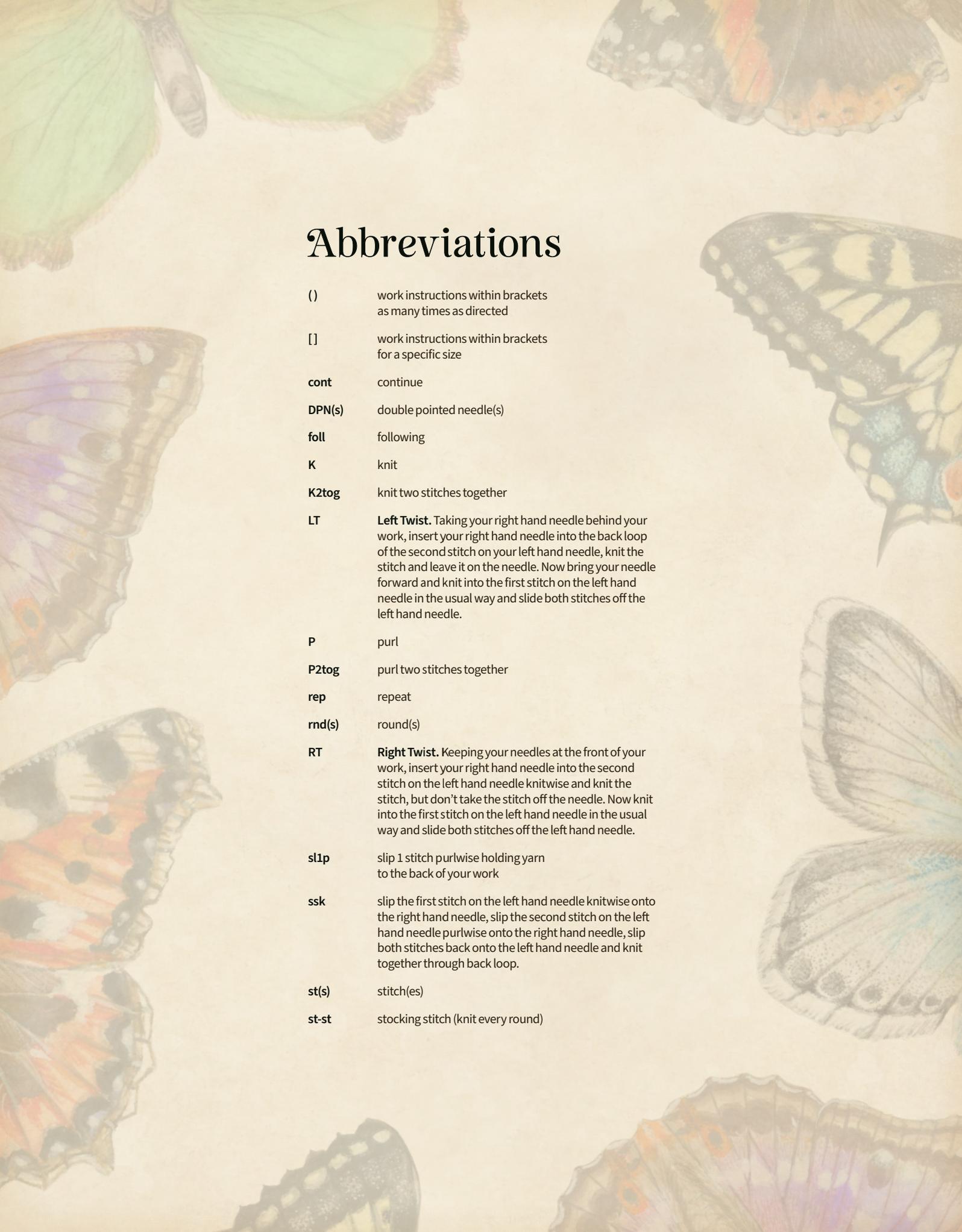

1. Red Admiral. [*Vanessa Atalanta*]. A well-characterized, medium-sized butterfly with black wings, red bands, and white spots. It has a wingspan of about 5 cm (2 in). Typically found in moist woodlands, the red admiral caterpillar's primary host plant is the stinging nettle.
2. Chalkhill Blue. [*Lysandra Coridon*], a small butterfly that can be found in England, Pommerania, and St. Petersburg southwards to Spain, Italy and Brussa, and from the Pyrenees to Orenburg, with a wingspan of 30–36 millimetres (1.2–1.4 in). The males having pale silvery-blue upper side of the wings with a submarginal line of grey spots on the hindwings and a thin brown and white chequered fringe. Occur from June till August.
3. Purple Emperor. [*Apatura Iris*]. Adults have dark brown wings with white bands and spots, and a small orange ring on each of the hindwings. Males have a wingspan of 70–80 millimetres (2.8–3.1 in), and have a purple-blue sheen caused by iridescence that the slightly larger (80–92 mm) females lack.
4. Yellow Swallowtail. [*Papilio Machaon*]. The UK's largest resident butterfly and has yellow wings with black vein markings. A wingspan of 65–86 millimetres (2.6–3.4 in). The hindwings of both sexes have a pair of protruding tails which give the butterfly its common name from the resemblance to the birds of the same name.
5. Green Hairstreak. [*Callophrys Rubi*]. A wingspan reaching about 26–30 millimetres (1.0–1.2 in) in length. The iridescent green colour is a structural colour caused by diffraction and interference of light by microscopic repeating structures forming a diffraction grating in the wing scales.
6. Small Tortoiseshell. [*Aglais Urticae*]. A wingspan ranging from 4.5 to 6.2 cm (1.7–2.5 in). While the dorsal surface of the wings is vividly marked, the ventral surface is drab, providing camouflage. Eggs are laid on the common nettle, on which the larvae feed. Once among the most common butterflies in Europe and temperate Asia, this butterfly is in very rapid decline, at least in Western Europe. This butterfly may be sensitive to climate change.

LT	<b>Left Twist.</b> Taking your right hand needle behind your work, insert your right hand needle into the back loop of the second stitch on your left hand needle, knit the stitch and leave it on the needle. Now bring your needle forward and knit into the first stitch on the left hand needle in the usual way and slide both stitches off the left hand needle.
P	purl
P2tog	purl two stitches together
rep	repeat
rnd(s)	round(s)
RT	<b>Right Twist.</b> Keeping your needles at the front of your work, insert your right hand needle into the second stitch on the left hand needle knitwise and knit the stitch, but don't take the stitch off the needle. Now knit into the first stitch on the left hand needle in the usual way and slide both stitches off the left hand needle.
sl1p	slip 1 stitch purlwise holding yarn to the back of your work
ssk	slip the first stitch on the left hand needle knitwise onto the right hand needle, slip the second stitch on the left hand needle purlwise onto the right hand needle, slip both stitches back onto the left hand needle and knit together through back loop.

## Equipment

### Three Options for Needles

One 2.5mm (UK12/US1.5) short circular needle and one set of 2.5mm (UK12/US1.5) DPNs.

Or one set of 2.5mm (UK12/US1.5) DPNs.

Or one 2.5mm (UK12/US1.5) 80cm long circular needle.

### For a Looser Cuff

One set of 3mm (UK11/US3) DPNs.

Stitch holder (optional).

Two stitch markers.

Wool needle.

## Tension

30 sts and 40/42 rows to 10cm over stocking stitch (worked in the rnd) on 2.5mm needles. Always use the size of needles to get the correct tension.

**It is essential to work to the stated tension to ensure success.**

These socks are knitted on 2.5mm needles, not 3.25mm as stated on the ball band. This will produce a different tension but will ensure a firmer, more hard-wearing fabric for your socks. The ideal tension for these socks is 30 stitches to 10cm (4in) so use whatever size needles are required to reach that tension and do check that your knitted fabric is firm but not stiff.

## Matching Socks

For matching socks, start knitting at the second colour into the ball as you don't know where the first one started, and pull the yarn out of the ball to find the repeat for the second sock.

## Working From a Chart

When working from a chart you will read all rounds from right to left.

## Finishing

Once your garment is complete it is essential to block your work. Pin your garment out to the size stated in the pattern, cover with a damp cloth and leave to dry.

## Cuff

Using 2.5mm DPNs (or 3mm for a looser cuff) and Purple Emperor, cast on 60 [64:68:72] sts.

The pattern has been written for a cast on with straight needles; if you wish to join into the round straight away, work row 1 twice and omit row 2.

**Row 1:** K1, (P2, K2) to last 3 sts, P2, K1, turn.

**Row 2:** Work all knit and purl stitches as they present themselves.

## Both Socks

Change to a 2.5mm short circular needle, 80cm long circular needle for magic loop or divide the stitches across DPNs and join into a circle. Place marker. You will sew up the small gap where you knitted the first two rows later.

Cont in rib as set for 14 more rnds.

## Leg

Using either the **written instructions** or **charts** for your size, start at rnd 1 and work the pattern as instructed, finishing on rnd 11.

## Both Socks

### Leg Pattern Panel (chart on pg 15)

**Rnd 1:** K1, P2, K2, P2, K1. (8 sts)

**Rnd 2:** K1, P1, RT, LT, P1, K1.

**Rnd 3:** K1, P1, K1, P2, K1, P1, K1.

**Rnd 4:** K1, RT, P2, LT, K1.

**Rnd 5:** K2, P4, K2.

**Rnd 6:** K8.

**Rnd 7:** As rnd 1.

**Rnd 8:** LT, P1, K2, P1, RT.

**Rnd 9:** P1, K1, P1, K2, P1, K1, P1.

**Rnd 10:** P1, LT, K2, RT, P1.

**Rnd 11:** P2, K4, P2.

**Rnd 12:** K8.

Rnds 1–12 set Leg Pattern Panel and are repeated.

### Leg Panel A (chart on pg 15)

**Rnd 1:** P1, K2, P1. (4 sts)

**Rnd 2:** P1, RT, P1.

**Rnd 3–12:** Rep rnds 1–2 five times.

Rnds 1–12 set Leg Panel A and are repeated.

### Leg Panel B (chart on pg 15)

**Rnd 1:** P1, K2, P1. (4 sts)

**Rnd 2:** P1, LT, P1.

**Rnd 3–12:** Rep rnds 1–2 five times.

Rnds 1–12 set Leg Panel B and are repeated.

### Leg Panel C (chart on pg 15)

**Rnd 1:** P1, K2, P2, K2, P1. (8 sts)

**Rnd 2:** P1, RT, P2, LT, P1.

**Rnd 3–12:** Rep rnds 1–2 five times.

Rnds 1–12 set Leg Panel C and are repeated.

## Left Sock

Use the Leg Pattern Panel as given before plus additional Leg Panels A or C for your size.

### 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Sizes Only

**Rnd 1:** Starting at rnd 1, work 8 sts of Leg Pattern Panel 7 [8] times, work 4 sts of Leg Panel A.

**Rnd 2 and every foll rnds:** Work 8 sts of Leg Pattern Panel 7 [8] times, work 4 sts of Leg Panel A.

### 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Sizes Only

**Rnd 1:** Starting at rnd 1, work 8 sts of Leg Pattern Panel 7 [8] times, work 8 sts of Leg Panel C.

**Rnd 2 and every foll rnds:** Work 8 sts of Leg Pattern Panel 7 [8] times, work 8 sts of Leg Panel C.

### All Sizes

Work Leg Pattern Panel 5 times finishing on rnd 11.

## Right Sock

Use the Leg Pattern Panel as given above plus additional Leg Panels B or C for your size.

### 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Sizes Only

**Rnd 1:** Starting at rnd 1, work 8 sts of Leg Pattern Panel 7 [8] times, work 4 sts of Leg Panel B.

**Rnd 2 and every foll rnds:** Work 8 sts of Leg Pattern Panel 7 [8] times, work 4 sts of Leg Panel B.

### 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Sizes Only

**Rnd 1:** Starting at rnd 1, work 8 sts of Leg Pattern Panel 7 [8] times, work 8 sts of Leg Panel C.

**Rnd 2 and every foll rnds:** Work 8 sts of Leg Pattern Panel 7 [8] times, work 8 sts of Leg Panel C.

### All Sizes

Work Leg Pattern Panel 5 times finishing on rnd 11.

## Both Socks

### Heel Flap

**Next rnd:** K to 17 [20:19:22] sts before marker.

**Change to 2.5mm DPNs** if you are using a short circular needle. There is no need to use DPNs if you are using the magic loop method. You may prefer to place the spare stitches from the top of the Foot onto a stitch holder if you are using a short circular or DPNs whilst you work the Heel.

**Set up row:** K30 [32:34:36], turn.

**Next row:** P to end, turn.

**Row 1:** K2, (sl1p, K1) to end, turn.

**Row 2:** Sl1p, P to end, turn.

**Row 3:** (Sl1p, K1) to end, turn.

Rep rows 2–3 until Heel measures 5 [6:7:8]cm or desired length, finishing on row 3.

### Turn Heel

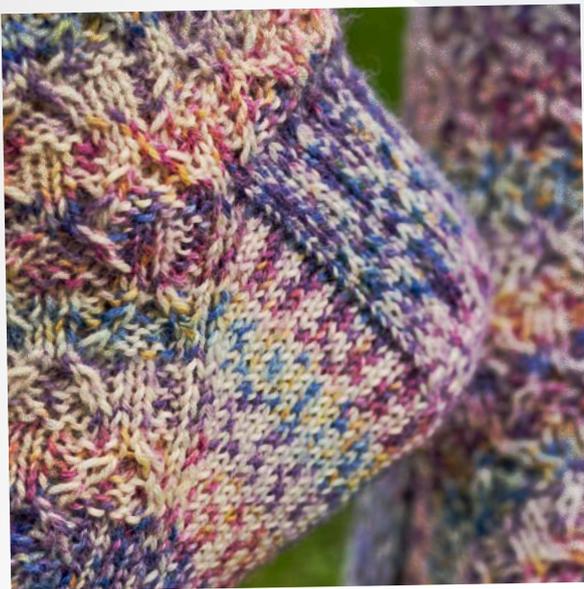
**Row 1:** Sl1p, P16 [17:18:19], P2tog, P1, turn.

**Row 2:** Sl1p, K5, ssk, K1, turn.

**Row 3:** Sl1p, P6, P2tog, P1, turn.

**Row 4:** Sl1p, K7, ssk, K1, turn.

Cont in this way, adding one stitch between slip stitch and ssk or P2tog on each row (ie, **Row 5:** Sl1p, P8, P2tog, P1, turn; **Row 6:** Sl1p, K9, ssk, K1, turn; etc) until all of the Heel sts are used. Depending on how many sts are in your Heel Flap, you may find that the K1 and P1 stitch is not required at the end of the last two rows.

Knit across heel sts if required to bring you to the left hand side of the Heel Flap (with the outside of the flap facing you), ready to pick up 1 stitch for every 2 rows of Heel Flap knitted. Remember that if you made the Heel Flap bigger, you will need to pick up more stitches. Once you have picked up the stitches, **place marker** for new beginning of round.

Work across the top of the foot sts as per the following instructions. Start at rnd 1, **place marker**, then pick up 1 stitch for every 2 rows of Heel Flap knitted up the other side of the Heel. Knit across the top of the Heel and shape the gusset as follows, and **at the same time**, working the pattern as set across the top of the Foot.

### Needle Note

If you are using DPNs and/or have placed your stitches on a stitch holder, you can arrange the needles as follows: **Needle 1** for stitches across Heel, **Needle 2** for picked-up stitches down side of Foot, **Needle 3** for stitches across top of Foot (work stitches off stitch holder if required), **Needle 4** for picked-up stitches on other side of Foot. You may find that stitch markers are not required at first.

**Rnd 2:** P2, (K2, P1, RT, LT, P1) 3 times, K2, P2.

**Rnd 4:** P2, (K2, RT, P2, LT) 3 times, K2, P2.

**Rnd 5:** P2, K3, (P4, K4) twice, P4, K3, P2.

**Rnd 7:** As rnd 1.

**Rnd 8:** (P1, RT, LT, P1, K2) 3 times, P1, RT, LT, P1.

**Rnd 9:** (P1, K1, P2, K1, P1, K2) 3 times, P1, K1, P2, K1, P1.

**Rnd 10:** (RT, P2, LT, K2) 3 times, RT, P2, LT.

**Rnd 11:** K1, (P4, K4) 3 times, P4, K1.

Rep rnds 1–12 once more.

## Shape Gusset

**Rnd 1:** K to 3 sts before the marker, K2tog, K1, **slip marker**, work in pattern as set using Foot instructions, **slip marker**, K1, ssk, K to marker.

**Rnd 2:** **Slip marker**, work in pattern as set, **slip marker**, K to 3 sts before marker.

**Rnd 3:** K2tog, K1, **slip marker**, work in pattern as set, **slip marker**, K1, ssk, K to marker.

Rep rnds 2–3 to shape the gusset. Cont in this way, decreasing by two stitches at the gusset on every other rnd until there are 60 [64:68:72] sts on the needle.

Once you have reached the required number of stitches, cont to work each rnd in pattern as set until you have worked rnd 29 [29:35:35] of Foot pattern.

Cont in st-st until Foot measures 5cm before the desired length ready to start the Toes. Don't be afraid to try your Sock on before decreasing for the Toes.

## Toes

### Needle Note

At some point whilst decreasing for the Toes, if you are using a short circular needle you may need to change back to DPNs or use the magic loop method as the number of stitches becomes too small for the circular. It's up to you when you choose to do that, and how you distribute the stitches across the needles; just keep following the pattern as set below.

Create the Toes as follows:

**Rnd 1:** K1, ssk, K24 [26:28:30] sts, K2tog, K1, **place marker** (if required), K1, ssk, K24 [26:28:30] sts, K2tog, K1. 56 [60:64:68] sts.

**Rnd 2:** Knit one rnd, **slipping markers** as you come to them.

**Rnd 3:** K1, ssk, K to 3 sts before marker, K2tog, K1, **slip marker**, K1, ssk, K to 3 sts before marker, K2tog, K1. 52 [56:60:64] sts.

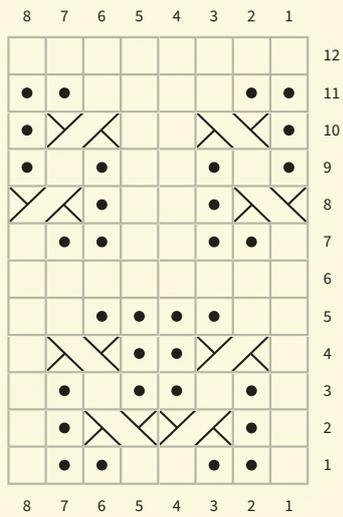
Rep rnds 2–3 until you have 28 [28:32:32] sts left and divide these between two needles so that front and back of Socks match.

Graft Toes using Kitchener stitch, weave in all ends and sew up the small gap at the Cuff where you cast on.



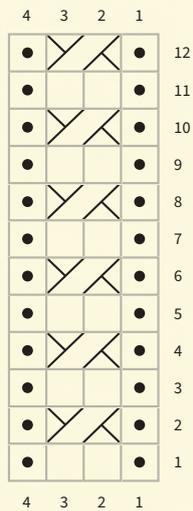

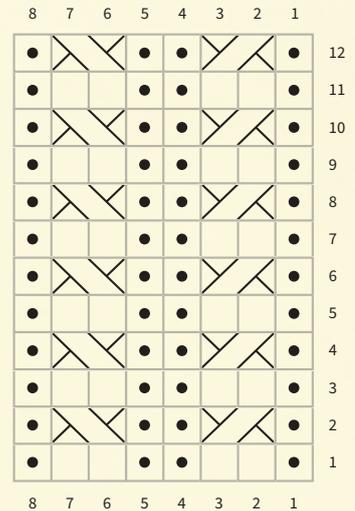

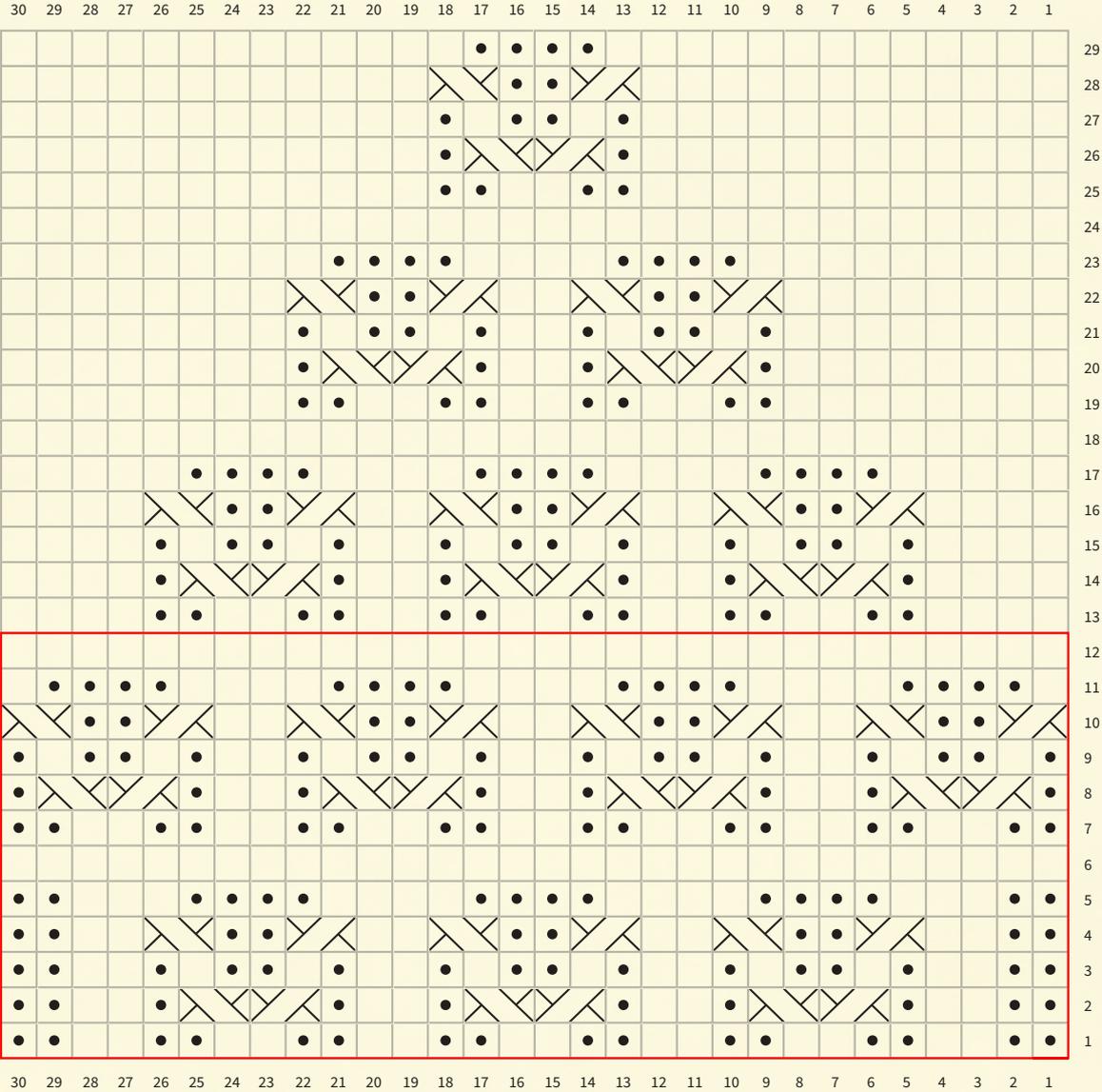

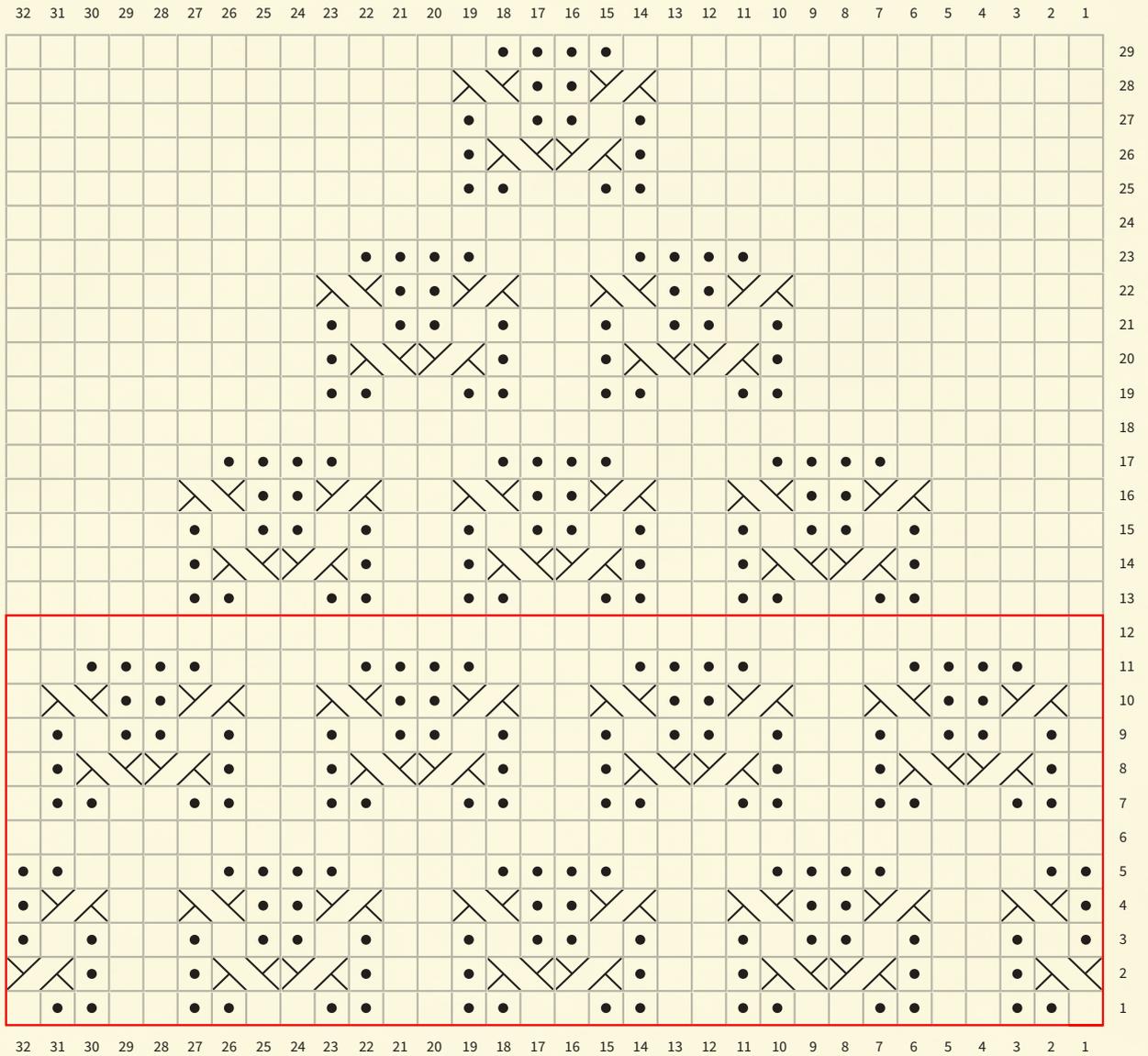

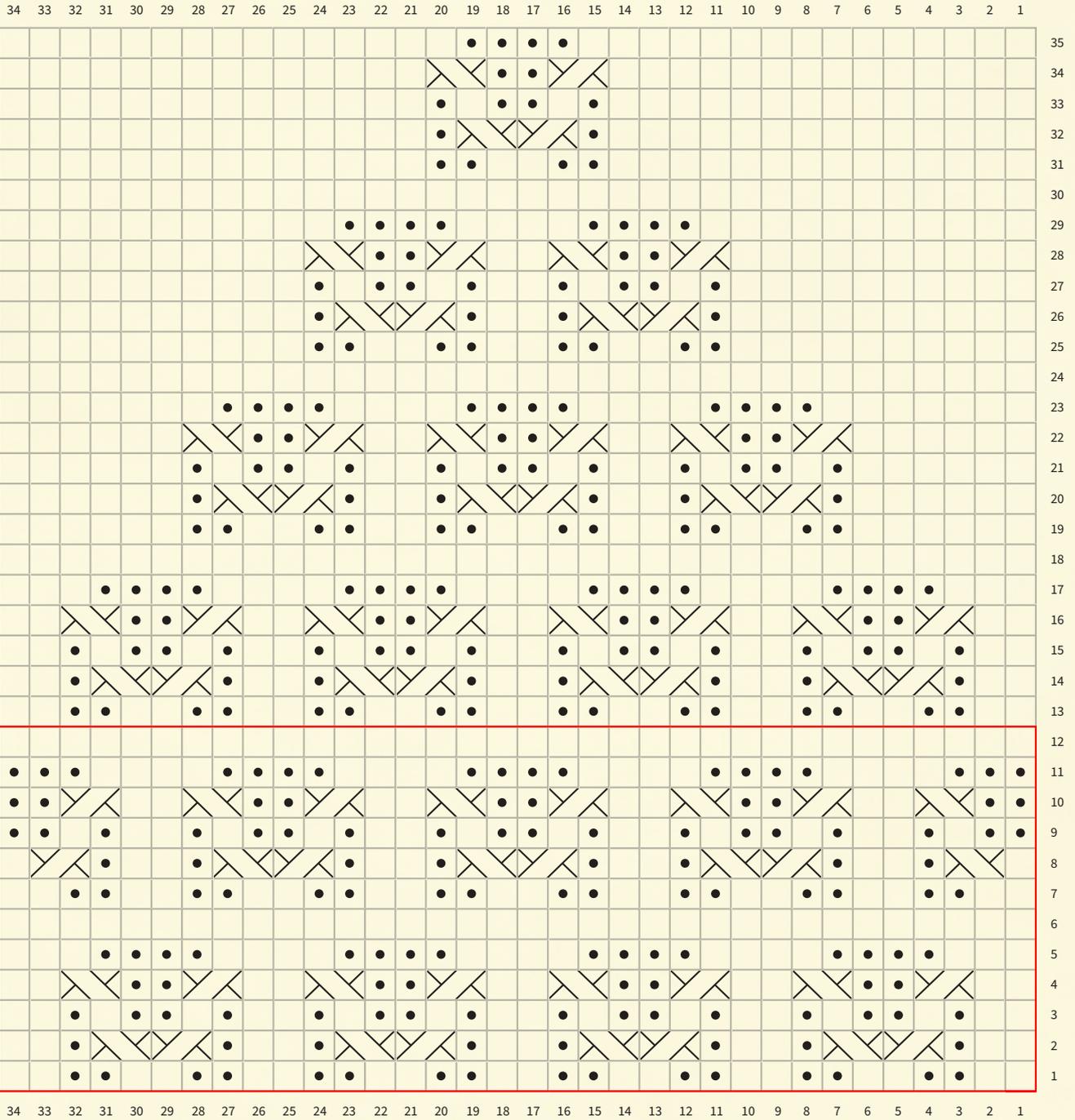

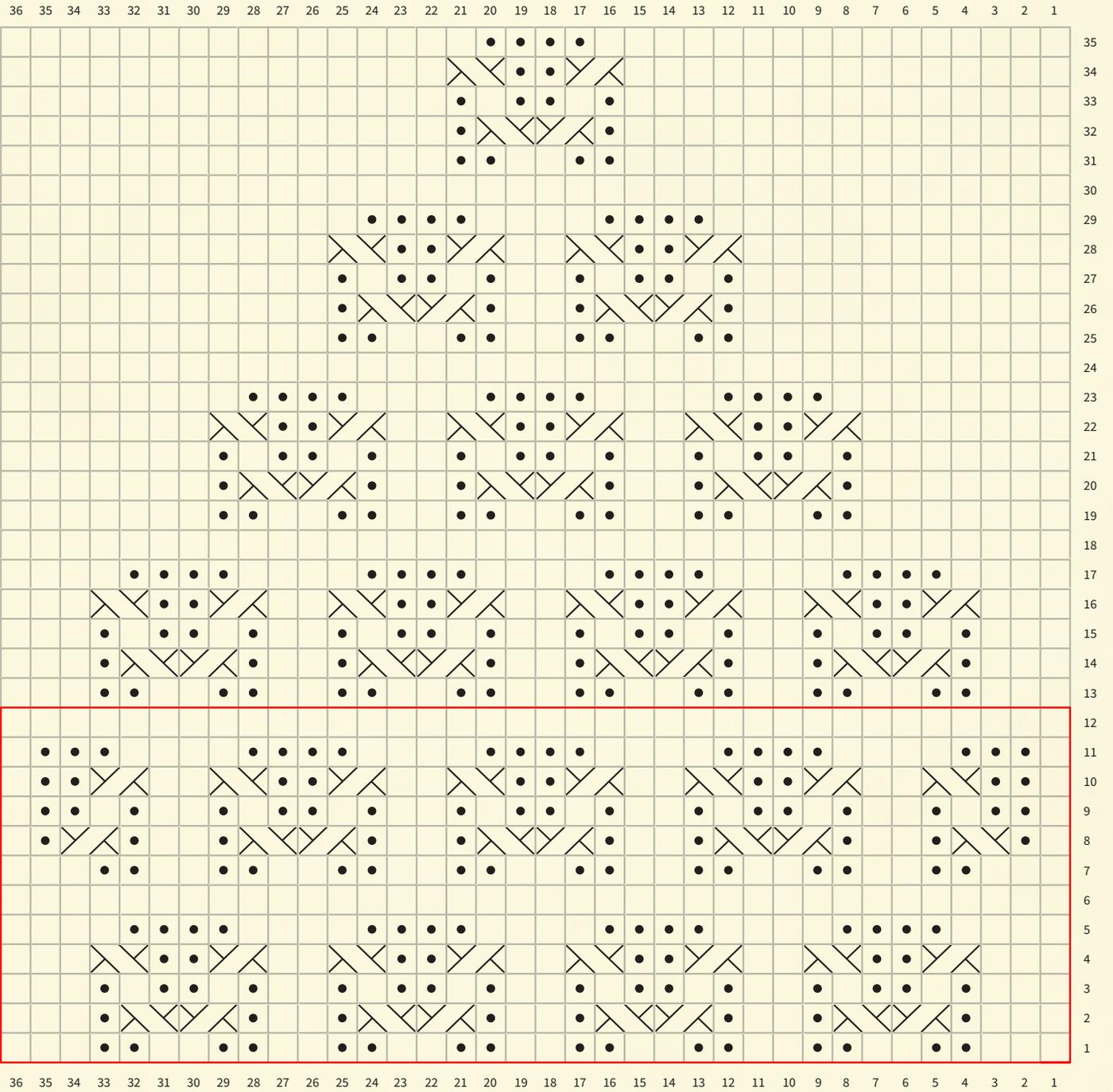
